Section A

Answer Question 01.

Source A

From Basket Three of the Final Act of the Helsinki Accords, which was signed by the USA and the USSR in 1975 at the Conference on Security and Co-operation in Europe in Helsinki.

The participating States will:

- respect human rights and fundamental freedoms, including freedom of thought, conscience, religion or belief, for all those without distinction as to race, sex, language or religion.
 - provide and encourage the effective exercise of civil, economic, social, cultural, and other rights and freedoms all of which derive from the inherent dignity of the human person and are essential to his free and full development. 5
 - recognise and respect the freedom of the individual to profess and practise religion or belief acting in accordance with the dictates of his own conscience.
 - recognise the universal significance of human rights and fundamental freedoms. 10

Source B

From a direct appeal to Brezhnev in 1978 from two Soviet musicians who were accused of being 'ideological degenerates' and acting against the USSR. They were deprived of their Soviet citizenship.

The Supreme Soviet of the USSR has deprived us of our Soviet citizenship. We are musicians. We live and breathe music. Our only 'crime' was that we gave refuge in our house to the writer Alexander Solzhenitsyn. For this, with your agreement, we were subjected to all sorts of persecution, which we found impossible to tolerate – cancellation of concerts, a boycott on the radio, television and in the press, and an attempt to paralyse our musical activities.

In this way, you obliged us to apply for an extended trip abroad; We now face fabricated charges and are deprived of our citizenship. We demand to be tried but under one condition - that the trial be open.

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With reference to these sources and your understanding of the historical context, which of these two sources is more valuable in explaining the Soviet attitude towards human rights under Brezhnev?
