Question 1

Study the following source material and then answer the questions which follow.

Source A Peter called the new city, St Petersburg, after his patron saint, and it became the glory of his reign, his 'paradise', his 'Eden', his 'darling'. In April 1706, he began a letter to his friend Menshikov, 'I cannot help writing to you from this paradise; truly we live here in heaven'. The city came to represent in brick and stone everything important in his life: his escape from the shadowy intrigue, 5 the tiny windows and the vaulted chambers of Moscow; his arrival on the sea; the opening to the technology and culture of Western Europe. Peter loved his creation. Construction of the city became his passion. No obstacle was great enough to prevent his carrying out his design. On it he lavished his energy, millions of roubles and thousands of lives.

Source B Adapted from Prince Mikhail Shcherbatov's reflections on the establishment of St Petersburg in a petition of the City of Moscow, 1787

Alas! Peter left Moscow. Whether out of necessity, to build a fleet, to create trade and commerce, to direct in person the war then taking place, or out of dislike for Moscow's ancient customs, he transferred his capital to the newly built city bearing his name. Moscow's best citizens left their home city to build new homes in a strange and evil land. Crowds of peasants were sent to cultivate the marshy and infertile soil surrounding St Petersburg. Moscow's buildings fell to ruins and it was forbidden to erect new ones.

Source C Peter had a vision of meeting the West on equal terms. To meet his aims a new Russia would have to emerge. New customs would have to be adopted: men must shave and wear western clothes; women must emerge from seclusion into polite society. Peter demanded his nobles accept such change and, by and large, they conformed. Russia appeared different with its westernised elite. But this was conformity, not conversion. They lived in St Petersburg by order, though they longed to return to Moscow. That these changes were never abandoned might be seen as a significant success for Peter. Despite the hopes of so many traditionalists, Russia did not return to its old ways.
